LOVE'S TANGO is a collection of original latin/jazz songs co-written by June Bisantz & Alexander Nakhimovsky. Bisantz & Nakhimovsky have recorded, performed and toured together since 2005. This is their third recording project together and first writing collaboration.

The CD features three bossa novas, two sambas, a Rachmaninoff-inspired string quartet prelude and one unique tango, from which the project gets its name. Featured along with the many accomplished musicians on this recording, are renowned trombonist Steve Davis and smooth jazz guitarist Norman Johnson.

Sings Chet Baker Vol. 2

Chet Baker's intimate vocals have influenced countless jazz artists, **June Bisantz** among them. In fact, the Connecticut-based singer follows *Let's Fall in Love*, her 2006 Chet Baker tribute album, with the self-released *It's Always You: June Bisantz Sings Chet Baker Vol. 2*. Bisantz keeps the proceedings appropriately hushed, her singing — which, many have noted, resembles that of Phoebe Snow — sensitively shaded by pianist Alex Nakhimovsky, guitarist Norman Johnson, bassist Matt Dwonszyk and drummer Ben Bellillo. The vocalist delivers shivers with an intonation that bears the glint of moonlit melancholy but hardly lacks for warmth — particularly when she's accompanied by just Nakhimovsky and Johnson, or solely by the guitarist, or when she goes it alone, as she does on an *a cappella* read of "Spring Is Here." Bisantz's horn-like phrasing floats atop the quartet's sterling accompaniment on "It's Always You," our selection. The track also features the Baker-like trumpet of Gabor Viragh and reminds listeners that the tribute was also a distinctively soulful horn player.

Litchfield Jazz Fest

Jazz greats and up-and-comers let it rip in Goshen—if it's jazz you're looking for, you're in the right place.

The Litchfield Jazz Festival will celebrate its 18th season at the Goshen Fairgrounds, Aug. 9-11. After a three-year stint at The Kent School, the festival returned to its roots last summer, and got its groove back.

A stellar lineup includes both seasoned and emerging artists. Opening the show, Emmet Cohen, the 22-year-old pianist and Litchfield Jazz Camp alum who recently placed third in the Thelonius Monk Piano Competition. After that featured headliner Strings Attached—an unlikely collaboration between jazz violinist Aaron Weinstein and his trio and Broadway diva Christine Ebersole—takes over.

Saturday's highlights are just as hot: Flamenco guitarist Val Ramos and his ensemble will perform Rumba Flamenca, and iconic bassist Avery Sharpe brings his Gospel Explosion & Sacred Songs featuring Yoron Israel and Onaje Allan Gumbs. The explosive Gary Smulyan Baritone Summit follows, and jazz master Ed- die Palmieri and his Latin Jazz Band end the set.

"I took myself over to Dan Blow's Music@Japanalia series in Hartford to see what all the fuss was about—and fell in love with the voice and the program," says Muir. Bisantz recently released *Let's Fall in Love*, an album inspired by Baker. Litchfield Jazz Camp director and saxophonist, Don Braden also takes the stage with his quartet, which includes pianist Gert Allen, Avery Sharpe and Alvin Alkinson. And The Vincent Herring-Eric Alexander Quintet brings "In the Spirit of Coltrane and Cannonball," a tribute to John Coltrane and Cannonball Adderley. A Latin dance party closes the festivities—Papo Vizaquez Mighty Pirates Troubadours do the honors. Advance tickets \$50 (incl. \$10 lawn); Friday gala \$150 to \$500; multi-day passes available.

June Bisantz, *It's Always You* (self-produced)

An offering by June Bisantz is the album "It's Always You", her second homage to Chet Baker after "Let's Fall in Love" from 2006. With a gentle voice she reminds us of the fragile world of the legendary trumpeter. The classically trained, Russian-born pianist Alex Nakhimovsky is responsible for the arrangements that together with Guitarist Norman Johnson and other musicians create a sensitive accompaniment. On "So Che Ti Perdero", a juke-box standard in this country at the beginning of the 1960s, the strings provide a breath of Ennio Moricones' original. These tracks are a little sweeter than Chet's - but you can't reach his vulnerability - it's of another world.

I attribute the highest praise to Nakhimovsky's piano in his duet with June, "Born to Be Blue." Also memorable are "Forgetful" and "You're Mine You", duets with the sensual guitar of Norman Johnson. Trumpeter Gabor Viragh faced a particular challenge - playing in the style of Chet Baker is not easy. However, the sound of his horn in "Ev'ry Time We Say Goodbye" is beyond praise.

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What is better than one creative mind, well two of course. Co-leaders June Bisantz, a lauded vocalist and pianist Alex Nakhimovsky have come together to create a decisively Latin flavored casting of original compositions that are inventive as well as artistic, while still maintaining a deeply musical vehicle. Bisantz has creativity in her bones, a Professor Emeritus of Art & Design at Eastern Connecticut State University her works have been exhibited in galleries, museums and public spaces throughout the United States is this unique purview that gives Bisantz her highly creative phrasing and refined style. The collaboration of June Bisantz and Alex Nakhimovsky melds together two magnificently creative souls into a distinctly Latin tinged album titled *Love's Tango*. As one would expect the album is filled with bossa, samba and tango, but what this album offers is not the usual Brazilian songbook, it is adorned with original compositions by Bisantz and Nakhimovsky. Though they have recorded together in the past, *Love's Tango* signals their first writing collaboration of all originals together. They are joined by Norman Johnson on guitar; Matt Dwonatzky on bass; Brumilda Myltaraj on violin; Lu San on viola; Kathy Schiano on cello; Marcus Centola on accordion; John Mastroianni on flute, clarinet, sax; Jeff Holmes on trumpet; Flugelhorn; Steve Davis on trombone and Ed Fast on drums, vibraphone & percussion. The result is an enduring listen that you will cherish for years to come.

The album kicks off with "This Reverte," its flavoring is reminiscent of Diana Krall's *The Look of Love* album in 2001, that featured easy going gentle bossas. What sets this collaboration between Bisantz and Nakhimovsky apart is their originals. Equally, Bisantz like Krall has an unassuming voice that is sweetly pleasing and Nakhimovsky's delicate touch is flawless, he has a stylistic beauty to his play that shimmers.

The album is not all bossa's and strings with sensual Latin guitar, on the title track "Love's Tango," a tune takes a distinctive Spanish overtone. Complete with castanets provided by Ed Fast, and the not often used accordion by Marcus Centola, the ensemble beautifully pays homage to the long tradition of tango. The beauty of the dance is immediately felt with the rhythms and lyrics. You are transported to the dance floor and relish in the reverence of the tango. Bisantz is once again simply delightful in her delivery, stylish with a hint of provocative sophistication, that simply fits the chic of the tune.

There is a depth to the songs on *Love's Tango* that goes beyond the standard songbook, the dual leaders have created refined originals that stand out as lasting pieces. This is a welcomed addition for anyone who enjoys a relaxing, yet slow burning listen with top-shelf performances. *Love's Tango* is an antidote to any long day. Album Review: Love's Tango from June Bisantz & Alexander Nakhimovsky

Love's *Tango*'s repertoire is comprised of original jazz-inspired, Latin-induced melodies co-written by June Bisantz and Alexander Nakhimovsky. From silky bossa nova arias to jamboree-style sambas, a compelling tango, and a steamy Rachmaninoff-influenced prelude, the recording revels in the joys of life, finding pleasure in the simple luxury of being surrounded by upbeat music.



The romantic lure of the swirling strings woven swiftly along "Prelude To a Wish" is the recording's moment to pay homage to the classical composer Rachmaninoff. Performed by Brunilda Myftaraj on violin, Lu San on viola and Kathy Schiano on cello, the tune is a garden bed of delightful sprigs, glimmering with an elegance that piques the audience's attention.

The CD commences with the gently breezy vapors of "A Wish That Came True," catacomb by the wispy tendrils of Norman Johnson's guitar strings and twinkling vibrations emanating from the leisurely stroll of Nakhimovsky's keys. The island sway in the rhythm pulse of Ed Fast's drums and Matt Dwonszyk's bass has a hypnotic touch on the listener.

Continuing to enchant the listener, the title track is silhouette in Marcus Centola's slinky accordion whirls and the graceful flutter of Myftaraj's violin strings, branding the melody in a confluence of folkloric and sophisticated features. The tango rhythm bodes well with Bisantz's registration and vocal strides.

Shifting again into bossa nova terrain, "Ocean Dreams" has a dreamy feel reminiscent of Antonio Carlos Jobim's "The Girl from Ipanema." The island-tinged instrumentation whisks the listener to a serene plane as Bisantz's smooth voicing caresses the downy bossa nova swells. Meanwhile, a samba strut canvasses "It's You" in a festive mood, traversing into the willowy bossa nova emanations of "The Reverie."

The repertoire on *Love's Tango* is contained within the confines of the Latin-influenced spectrum but such restraints do not diminish its appeal. The music is lovely and Bisantz's vocals are evenly tempered, which reels the listener into a peaceful state of being.

Rich toned vocalist and classy pianist Alex Nakhimovsky lead a 4 member rhythm team, 3 member string section and horn section respectively through a breezy collection of irresistible sambas and beyond.

There's a happy little place in the music section of my brain where I really respond to tropical jazz, that smooth yet enormous sound that floats along with the tradewinds, that stuff made so popular in the '50s and '60s by people like Martin Denny and Henry Mancini. The perfect trigger for me, for this kind of connection, is Mancini's "Lush," which I'd never heard until I watched the 2000 film *Sexy Beast* with the amazing Ben Kingsley. Or perhaps Annette Bening's character in *American Beauty* playing an old recording of "Bali Haï" during dinner also evokes that same sense of adventure, coupled with a supreme sense of being at rest while enjoying the spoils.

Singer June Bisantz and pianist Alex Nakhimovsky have toured together since 2005. They also love a lot of the same things--classical music, for instance, and Latin rhythms. The first few minutes of this new album is directed right at the heart of the world of tango, which shouldn't be a surprise, but you'll start to hear those same shifts in the music, toward Mancini and Denny, and that's when those emotional connections are made and it all sounds so lush and beautiful. Actually, it sounds Lush and Beautiful, because this is the type of music I think about when I hear those two words. Remember the old Calgon bubble bath commercials? Like that.



It's the classical training this duo shares--they both played violins as their first instrument--that really stretches out that gorgeous Tahitian sunset, the one that was filmed in Technicolor. Bisantz's voice is smooth, mellow and beckoning--by that last word I mean that she's calling out to you to pack your bags and come along. Nakhimovsky's piano is staid and provides that stability for the soloists to shine--Norman Johnson's guitar, winning horn and string sections

and Ed Faust's amazing support on all sorts of percussion. The perspective can shift depending on Bisantz--it moves in close when she's singing, and then it pulls away and spreads out when she steps back to enjoy the solos.

Love's Tango really sails when all decks are on hand, and I promise to stop using nautical terms after that. But that's the essence of this music, the big string sections, the sound of musical notes skipping along the tops of waves, the feeling of that warm wind across your face. That's not a bad thing in the middle of winter. I warned you that that a lot of tango was coming this way, and it was going to be "a thing" in 2019. Now I'm just wondering if it's a seasonal thing, a way to comfort jazz fans and get them through the winter in one piece. I see no problem with that, it's working.



About June Bisantz

Even before knowing that Bisantz has a background in visual arts, audiences can hear the color of the songs she sings. In addition to color, there is also texture. Bisantz is Professor Emeritus of Art and Design at Eastern Connecticut University State University. Her visual art has been exhibited in museums, galleries and other public spaces throughout the United States.

In regard to music, Bisantz has co-written and produced several collection of original vocal jazz, all of which has garnered attention from critics across the US. Her musical career also includes working with some luminaries from the world of jazz. Articles about Bisantz's music have appeared in People Magazine, USA Today, Jazziz Magazine, Jazz Today, The New York Times and several others. Among those Bisantz has worked with are Steve Swallow, Bob Moses, Paul Brown, Lew Soloff.

About Alex Nakhimovsky

Pianist Alex Nakhimovsky has toured internationally. He works as a performer, recording artist, producer, composer and educator. Nakhimovsky works in both classical music and jazz.

Nakhimovsky's work has taken him to Russia, Japan and Israel, in addition to the United States. Like his collaborator, Bisantz, Nakhimovsky's work has included projects and performances with jazz legends such as Benny Golson, Jimmy Cobb, Curtis Fuller, Bill Evans, Jazmeia Horn and Rene Marie among other. He is currently co-founder and artistic director of the BSBI Jazz Festival in Manchester, Connecticut.

The sound of "Love's Tango" by June Bisantz and Alex Nakhimovsky

The songs that Bisantz and Nakhimovsky bring to life have not only color -- the sounds they create can make audiences think of pastels, but the songs have texture as well. Certain listeners will easily see swirling pastel tulle and jersey fabrics.

The songs are emotive and intimate. They invite leaning forward and gaining an understanding of how the songs are put together.

The songs are invariably about love, but the approach is a bit different depending on the song. The sound elements of accordion and strings add an emotional and dramatic flair to song's such as the title track, "Love's Tango."

Bisantz and Nakhimovsky are joined by an eclectic and busy ensemble to help them round out the soundscape of "Love's Tango." With guitar, bass, violin, viola, cello, accordion, flute, clarinet, sax, trumpet, flugelhorn, trombone, drums, vibraphone and percussion.

The sound of "Love's Tango" the song evokes the sound of Italy, due in no small part to the number of instruments used to give the song a rich sound.

"This Reverie" is another song on the album that transports listeners by virtue of sound that feels as though it is imbued with color and movement. Bisantz's voice is richly textured and stronger than audiences might believe it to be. There is a slightly breathy quality to her lower register voice. Together June Bisantz and Alex Nakhimovsky have collaborated a deliciously Latin slanted release titled Love’s Tango, that features melodies by Nakhimovsky and lyrics by Bisantz.

Bisantz has an entrancing voice, its deep and also opulently hued, with an alto tonality that adds to the sensuality of the lyrics, which she is fully committed to. Her lyric content is full of strong picturization and story lines that connect the listener to the journey. Often, I found myself checking the CD to see if it was a Latin standard, when indeed it was an original, as they all are.

A fine example is “A Wish That Came True,” Bisantz rings true on the bottom register notes, the melody is exotic and refreshingly airy at the same time. Another robustly rich tune is the percussion driven tune “It’s You.” Ed Fast is the featured percussionist on this tune, his effervescent rhythm is accented by the horn section and the nimble fingers of guitarist Norman Johnson.

Love’s Tango is popping with sparkling melodies and outstanding performances. A fine collaboration by two talented writers that equally stand up to the task when performing. Its certainly clear they have a winning sound and a recipe for songwriting that is scrumptious.

Life lived live!

June Bisantz immortalizes Chet Baker's other love songs in 'It's Always You'

Chet Baker is one of those mythic figures in jazz that either inspires total devotion or total revulsion. The late jazz trumpeter and vocalist put “My Funny Valentine” on the map at the height of his career in 1959. He left this earth with a bang in 1988 at the still tender age of 59, head smashed in, sprawled on the street below an Amsterdam hotel, where authorities would sift through his heroin and cocaine stash. His legacy as a musical wunderkind with movie star looks and a nasty drug habit would spark followers for generations.

Known in those early times as the James Dean of jazz, actual movie stars would come to see him play throughout the West Coast. Jazz stars of a certain stature, like Miles Davis and Stan Getz, didn’t care much for Baker, or he for them. The guy soon developed a bad reputation as a junkie, philanderer, wife beater, and a lot worse. But for many hip to a new, West Coast sound, he seemed tailor-made to lead the revolution, with a tone and a groove so pure, spare, and willowy as to cause hearts to swoon.

The inspired female vocalists of their day, then and now, often improve on the subject matter in their Chet Baker covers. They seem to add the romantic longing and poetic beauty they hear in his music, even these spare vocals.

June Bisantz is one of those vocalists. She’s such an admirer of Baker’s music that she’s put out two records in tribute, *Let’s Fall in Love* from 2005 and most recently, the self-produced *It’s Always You*, Vol. 2.

It’s Always You features 12 more of Baker’s songs, including the favorites (“I Get Along Without You Very Well,” “My Ideal,” “Ev’ry Time We Say Goodbye,” “I Don’t Stand A Ghost Of A Chance”) and lesser-known gems (“So Che Ti Perdero,” “You’re Mine You,” “Everything Depends On You”). Baker wrote “So Che Ti Perdero (I Know That I’ll Lose You)” while spending time in Italy.

Vol. 2 of the tribute albums also features pianist/arranger Alex Nakhimovsky and guitarist/recording/mastering Norman Johnson, along with other musicians for different tracks. Other musicians visit with bass (Matt Owmazayk), drums (Ben Bellis), conga/baker (Kan Yasabel), viola (Katalin Viragh), violin/viola (Carolee Lisi), cello (Eric Dahlin), and trumpet/flugelhorn (Gabor Viragh).

Befitting a Chet Baker collection and that depleted, deflated Chet Baker style, Bisantz leaves well enough alone on the tried-and-true tracks. She only leaves her own pale-moon, feminine grooves on the melodies, letting the instrumentalists follow that well-worn path with special highlights along the way, gently coaxing out what was meant to be.

Her vocals are soft, but embed the lyrics themselves with a deep, resonant tonality, a full-bodied residue that melts the words until there is just a groan in the aftermath of emotional collapse, helplessness in “You’re Mine You,” raw, self-conscious need on “I Don’t Stand A Ghost Of A Chance,” contentment in longing for the Disney-esque “My Ideal,” a ballet music box of a cover.

The instrumentalists on this record hold back too. There is just enough of a strum of a light guitar, hand in hand with Bisantz’s light, lifting vocals, until the bare essence of a fan’s view of Chet Baker is all you hear.

The faint illusion is very clear, all the way up to the album cover devised by visual artist Bisantz. There she is in the foreground, wearing shades and looking like Sia, as a much younger, more innocent-looking Chet Baker is superimposed in the background, trumpet in hand, gazing forlornly off into the distance, away from her, the camera, the entire world.

LET'S FALL IN LOVE: JUNE BISANTZ SINGS CHET BAKER . Toodle-e Records

Any album saluting the wonderful jazz trumpeter and sometime singer Chet Baker gets my attention and my ear. It's a pretty safe bet you'll start with top-drawer and emotional material in any case, as he favored well-crafted, plaintive melodies and lyrics. Once again, I bring you good news: this is a keeper.

June Bisantz Evans works primarily as a visual artist, although in my eclectic collection of old vinyl, I have some 1980s recordings under the group name "Mister Spats" with June as the lead vocalist and co-writer of the jazzy songs. She's made a few recordings, including a solo album 10 years ago. This new CD revisits some standards with Baker's low-key, languid style in mind, but comes across as just plain warm rather than warmed-over. What's been included in June's tunes? Not the expected Chet signature "Let's Get Lost," and the album title doesn't mean you get the standard "Let's Fall In Love" either (it refers to the key line in the opener "For Heaven's Sake"). There are 12 tracks, all strong entries. Classics such as a slow, reflective "Come Rain Or Come Shine," shorn of its intrinsic determination, are attractive in their own way. Another Broadway number is "I've Never Been In Love Before" from *Guys And Dolls* which also takes its time but is worth the time it takes: it's drenched in romance. Two show tunes from Rodgers and Hart, "My Funny Valentine" and "Blue Room," also make for slo-mo happy moods. June evokes Chet Baker's small voice and tender, thoughtful phrasing and is aided by the skilled Gabor Viragh standing in as the trumpet and fluegelhorn man.

Sorrow and fragility do not overwhelm the atmosphere even though they linger at the edges. Although she sounds quite sensitive and thoughtful, June's timbre conjures up a person with more emotional distance and perspective. In fact, there's an older-but-wiser maternal presence, a bit in the later Rosemary Clooney mold. Her timbre also reminds me of Nancy Wilson, even more so in the Mister Spats work where she used more voice.

In preparing to write this comparison study, I also went back and re-listened to some Chet Baker vocals I hadn't heard for a while. It was a refreshing refresher course, but confirmed that this is not a knockoff copy nor a radical departure. The essence is there, but there's some freshness, too. The good taste and subtle, skilled playing from the band members here should not be underestimated. The players are to be commended. In addition to the aforementioned brass player, pianist Alex Nakhimovsky is quite wonderful and gets ample opportunity to be heard and add to the classy environment.
